The Master of Education program deepens teachers' skills to elevate their educational practices. UCDS College for School Culture graduates understand, design, and transform schools to support cultures of learning, thinking, and community.



Elevating the Practice of Education

The UCDS College for School Culture, Master of Education program features courses and practicum experiences focused on culture, reflection, and innovative practice. Graduate students learn with the colleagues in their cohort, practice mentorship, and teach collaboratively. Graduate students study while being a part of a school in action throughout the program. The academic program unites theory and practice and prepares graduates to become agents of change in education.

The UCDS College for School Culture awards a Master of Education degree with a teaching leadership focus. The program prepares educators to invigorate and innovate the art of teaching. Graduates are the next generation of leaders in their classrooms and schools.

UCDS College for School Culture At-A-Glance

Overview

Whether new to education or an experienced professional, the UCDS College for School Culture will help you to elevate your practice. The program lends itself to full-time study while you work in a classroom. The goal is to have graduate students experience schools in action. A practicum focus means Master of Education candidates will spend quality time interfacing with their cohort, with program faculty, and in classrooms working with students.

Campus

The UCDS College for School Culture is located in Seattle, WA. Master's degree students attend courses in-person. The UCDS College for School Culture building is one mile from the University of Washington in Seattle's University District neighborhood – a fast-growing urban neighborhood just a little north of downtown.

Program length and credits required

The M.Ed. program is designed as a two-year long experience. 55 credits are required to earn a degree. Courses are offered only once per year, and students progress through the course of study as a cohort.

Calendar

The 2020-2021 academic calendar extends from August 10, 2020 – June 3, 2021.

Schedule

Courses are taught Tuesday and Thursday afternoons from 4:00 pm to 8:30 pm. Practicum hours are scheduled during the day over the course of the week and will vary depending on student placement and work schedule. UCDS will work with each graduate student to find appropriate practicum placement or schedule. Graduate students who are currently teaching can use their work to meet the requirements of the practicum experience.

Enrollment

The UCDS College for School Culture will enroll one cohort of students to begin in August of 2020.

Tuition

For enrollment in the 2019-2020 school year, tuition will be \$13,275.

Advising

The UCDS College for School Culture is small by design. Advising and student support services are highly personalized. The faculty dedicates significant time and attention to every student in the program. Advising and guidance are built into the course of study through Cohort during year one and Capstone during year two. Weekly Cohort and Capstone meetings focus on practicum experiences, program synthesis across courses, project planning, and goal setting.

Capstone

Completing a capstone project is a degree requirement for the M.Ed. program. Successful capstone projects demonstrate evidence of inquiry, collaboration, innovation, communication, and reflection. Graduate students design capstone projects in collaboration with UCDS College for School Culture faculty. Each project is designed around the graduate student's educational questions and interests and conducted as a type of action research.

Action research is a disciplined process of inquiry conducted by and for those taking the action. Action research allows graduate students to define the questions and goals for their own practice. The goal of action research is for the graduate student or actor to evaluate, reflect, refine, and improve their own practice. The capstone project gives Master's candidates a relevant, in-depth experience that will provide essential tools for educational leaders.

Library

To support educational and research needs, UCDS College for School Culture Master's degree candidates have access to two library systems: the UCDS library for children and teachers and the University of Washington Libraries.
